The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 2004 (IDEA) focuses on each state's accountability on the State Performance Plan (SPP) indicators defined by the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP). OSEP reviews each state's SPP and Annual Performance Report (APR) annually. Using the information obtained through review of the APR and other data sources, OSEP evaluates each state's performance on these indicators, and assigns each state to one of four levels of determination: Meets Requirements, Needs Assistance, Needs Intervention, or Needs Substantial Intervention. The determinations required under the federal statute are part of the ongoing efforts to improve results for children and youth with disabilities. On June 6, 2008, OSEP issued its determination letters to each state's lead agency for Part B on the implementation of IDEA for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2006, the 2006-2007 academic year. OSEP notified the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) that Maryland's Part B was at the level of Needs Assistance.

Pursuant to 20 U.S.C. §1416(a)(1)(C)(i), states are required to assign these same levels of determination annually under §1416(d) to each local school system based on performance. In accordance with §1416(e) of IDEA 2004, states must use one of the following four categories to assign a determination to each local school system: Meets Requirements, Needs Assistance, Needs Intervention, and Needs Substantial Intervention.

The MSDE, Division of Special Education/Early Intervention Services, uses a results-based rubric on specific indicators to rate each public agency's performance in meeting the State's targets as defined by the SPP for Part B. Attached is a document entitled "Part B Indicators Considered in Making Determinations" that lists the Part B indicators considered in making determinations. MSDE carefully considered all aspects of this process. Based on available data, as well as information obtained through monitoring and complaint investigations, the Allegany County Public Schools has been determined to be *Needs Assistance (Year 2)*.

Specific factors affecting MSDE's determination that Allegany County Public Schools *Needs Assistance* include not demonstrating substantial compliance with two of seven compliance indicators (11 and 13). Pursuant to these requirements, MSDE is advising Allegany County Public Schools of available sources of technical assistance related to Indicator 11 (Initial Evaluation Timeline) and Indicator 13 (Secondary Transition).

The MSDE FFY 2005 determination for Allegany County Public Schools was also *Needs Assistance*. In accordance with 20 U.S.C. §1416(e) and 34 C. F. R. §§300.600 and 300.604, if a local school system is determined to be in need of assistance for two consecutive years, MSDE must take one or more of the following actions: 1) Advise the local school system of available sources of technical assistance that may help the local school system address the areas in which the local school system needs assistance; 2) Direct the use of federal funds to the area or area(s) the local school system needs assistance; or 3) Identify the local school system as a high-risk grantee and impose special conditions on the local school system's IDEA Part B grant award.

In collaboration with MSDE, Allegany County Public Schools is to identify the type, amount, and frequency of assistance needed to address the specific needs in Indicators 11 and 13. MSDE is available to consult with local school systems by telephone, fax, email, mail, or in-person. Attached is a list of Division personnel, with contact information, for each SPP indicator.

As you know, the State must report annually to the public on the performance of each local school system on the targets in the SPP under IDEA. The public may access the information about Maryland's performance at <http://mdideareport.org>. The requirement for public reporting on local school system performance is a critical provision in ensuring accountability focusing on improved results for students with disabilities. MSDE will continue to provide technical assistance opportunities as you work to improve performance under Part B of the IDEA.

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 2004 (IDEA) focuses on each state's accountability on the State Performance Plan (SPP) indicators defined by the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP). OSEP reviews each state's SPP and Annual Performance Report (APR) annually. Using the information obtained through review of the APR and other data sources, OSEP evaluates each state's performance on these indicators, and assigns each state to one of four levels of determination: Meets Requirements, Needs Assistance, Needs Intervention, or Needs Substantial Intervention. 

The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act 2004 (IDEA) focuses on each state's accountability on the State Performance Plan (SPP) indicators defined by the Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP). OSEP reviews each state's SPP and Annual Performance Report (APR) annually. Using the information obtained through review of the APR and other data sources, OSEP evaluates each state's performance on these indicators, and assigns each state to one of four levels of determination: Meets Requirements, Needs Assistance, Needs Intervention, or Needs Substantial Intervention. The determinations required under the federal statute are part of the ongoing efforts to improve results for children and youth with disabilities. 

The determination of **Needs Substantial Intervention** subjects BCPSS local application for federal funds to the following special conditions:

- MSDE staff will increase off-site and on-site monitoring activities to ensure that the grant is appropriately implemented;
- In addition to the mid-year and final grant progress reports, progress reports are required according to the schedule set forth in each corrective action plan (CAP);
- BCPSS must continue to work cooperatively with MSDE and the Intensive Management Capacity Improvement Team (IMCIT) and actively seek available sources of technical and management assistance for improvement and the correction of noncompliance identified through monitoring, Letters of Findings, and other applicable requirements; and
- As a high-risk grantee, BCPSS must continue to develop, implement, review, and revise any MSDE directed CAPs to ensure correction of noncompliance as soon as possible and in no case later than one year.

Specific factors affecting MSDE's determination that BCPSS **Needs Substantial Intervention** include: (1) Not meeting State targets for performance Indicators 1, 2, 5A, 5B, and 5C; (2) Data demonstrating less than substantial compliance for Indicators 4 and 11; (3) Continued failure to correct all previously identified noncompliance within timelines; and (4) Failure to substantially comply affects core requirements, such as delivery of services and the provision of effective general supervision and oversight. Pursuant to these requirements, MSDE is advising BCPSS of available sources of technical assistance related to Indicator 4 (Suspension), Indicator 11 (Initial Evaluation Timeline), Indicator 13 (Transition), and Indicator 15 (General Supervision).

- Part B Local Determination Framework for Assistance and Intervention; and

In collaboration with MSDE, BCPSS will identify the type, amount, and frequency of assistance needed to address the specific needs in Indicators 1, 2, 5A, 5B, 5C, 4, 11, 13, and 15. MSDE is available to consult with local school systems by telephone, fax, email, mail, or in-person. Attached is a list Division personnel, with contact information, for each SPP indicator.
